Instructions

- Collect some recycled materials and packaging. Egg boxes, milk bottles and cereal boxes all work well.
- 2. Arrange your recycled materials until you have made a lion face. Use a picture of a lion to help you.
- 3. Stick down the lion features with strong glue and leave to dry.
- 4. Have fun decorating with pieces of colourful tissue and other craft materials. Make your lion mask as colourful as you like!
- 5. Cut strips of sugar paper and wrap them Around a pencil. Hold them there for a minute and unfurl. Repeat this and then glue the curly strips to your lion mask along with some wool to create a dramatic mane. Roarsome!


Stand out from the herd in animal inspired fancy dress – and help us to protect our planet to help people and wildlife thrive.

Instructions

- 1. Print out your mask template.
- 2. Stick the template to some card (we find an old cereal box works well!)
- 3. Cut around your mask remember to cut out the eye holes!
- 4. Punch holes (or use a knitting needle but ask an adult to help you) where the small grey circles are marked and add some string or elastic to keep your mask in place.
- 5. Choose which animal you want to make your mask into; a terrific stripy tiger, a majestic gorilla or a flashy flamingo, the options are endless!
- 6. Now for the creative part! Out of the recycled cardboard you have collected, cut out ears, or a beak, a trunk or a nose, to make up your animal face.
- 7. Decorate your mask using colourful crayons, paint or marker pens. You might choose to use some colourful tissue paper or recycled fabric to make it wonderfully unique!
- 8. Now, put on your mask and Wear it Wild!




SOME EXTRA SHAPES AND PATTERNS TO HELP YOU



Rhinos once roamed throughout Europe, Asia and Africa, and were known to early Europeans who depicted them in cave paintings. Within historical times, they were still widespread across Africa's savannas and Asia's tropical forests.

But today, very few rhinos survive outside protected areas. And all five species are threatened, primarily by poaching.

Celebrate these incredible creatures by creating your very own rhino mask!

What you need

- An old milk bottle
- Recycled card
- PVA glue
- Strong glue or tape
- Newspaper
- Colourful tissue paper
- Pens or paint










Indoor fun

Instructions

- 1. Collect an old plastic milk bottle and rinse it out and dry it. Cut off the base just below the handle.
- 2. Using the recycled card you have collected, make 3 cone shapes, one very small, one medium sized and one to fit your head, like a hat!



- 4. Mix a small pot of PVA glue with water to make a paste. Stick lots of small pieces of newspaper to the milk carton, painting lots of glue paste over the top. Leave until completely dry.
- 5. Paint the largest cone green and brown and leave to dry. Snip off the top of the cone and then cut strips from the top to about half way down, so it looks like long grass.
- 6. Attach the milk bottle to the green cone hat carefully with strong tape or glue.
- 7. Now just add the rhino's eyes and your fantastic 'Rhino in its habitat' hat is ready to wear!
